

Proverbs Week 6: Sloth

Primary Passages: Proverbs 24:30-34, Proverbs 26:13-16

Related Passages: Genesis 1:26, Proverbs 13:4 and 21:25-26,

Philippians 4:10-13

"It is a mistake to think that sloth is laziness. More than indolence (or apathy) sloth rejects the burden of order, choosing instead the breezy lightness of freedom. Loving self more than relation, and autonomy more than the good, in sloth one rejects the weight and density of living in an ordered creation. In sloth we abhor what is there. We abhor what is. We abhor limits and place and order and being. Our misguided addiction to freedom without truth is a revolt of the self against any charged world which might demand attention, care, obligation, or respect. And certainly against any mandate of working to fill God's beautiful kingdom. They are seen as insufferable demands. As illegitimate restrictions on our unbridled freedom. And so we find ourself hating the place God has provided, the work God has given to us, and the proper ways of laboring."
